

### TOP FAMILY ACTIVITIES IN THE STOUR VALLEY

#### Exploring at a slower pace...

Take a family nature walk and let the children run wild and free. You can explore the Valley and Wool Towns by foot using quiet country lanes and public paths. There are a range of guided and self-guided walks, see below for more information:

#### essexwalks.com Bringing heritage alive

Whether it be climbing to the top of the castle motte at Clare Castle Country Park or going to the splendid Kentwell Hall, the history and archaeology of the Stour Valley tells some fascinating stories. Families can try archery or look for the legendary Bures dragon etched on the hillside. The dragon is best viewed from St Stephen's Chapel CO8 5LD where visitors can also see stained glass and medieval graffiti. Check website before visiting - the chapel is on private ground with access by permissive footpath. bures-online.co.uk/chapel/chapel\_barn.htm

The Wool Towns of the Stour Valley -Clare, Long Melford, Sudbury, Lavenham and Hadleigh are some of the best-preserved historic towns and prettiest villages in the region. Exploring them can feel like stepping back in time to the 15th century, when the wool trade was at its peak. See Wool Towns of the Stour Valley guide for more...

#### Paddling the River Stour

The textile industry was focused along the River Stour and its tributaries. Riverside mills (some still stand today) processed the wool and working barges, known locally as Stour Lighters, navigated the Stour. With the river gently meandering through this outstandingly beautiful landscape, it's a special place to simply 'be' in the moment. Watch and listen to the water

rushing over a sluice gate or play pooh sticks on a bridge. Take a canoe or boat trip through one of the operators and enjoy the tranquillity of being on the water - spot a streaking blue kingfisher and damselflies dancing over the water.



#### Getting closer to nature

- Watch a 'Constable cloud'
- Hug a tree
- See ducks dabble
- Hear woodpigeons 'coo'
- Find a 'whomping' willow
- Look for rainbows
- Jump in muddy puddles
- Throw fallen leaves in the air
- Find colours in nature
- Look for animal tracks Spot 5 different leaves
- Spot 10 different birds



Experiencing nature is good for people's health and wellbeing. Come rain or shine, the Stour Valley provides a home for over 1,500 plants, 175 birds and almost 1,000 moths, including iconic species such as black poplar and cricket bat willow. The area has many nature reserves, designated wildlife sites and protected areas, including the Dedham Vale Area of Outstanding Natural

Beauty, which all support numerous wildlife conservation initiatives.

Go on an adventure outside before sunrise and listen to the dawn chorus (springtime is the loudest!) Follow nature trails to see the wildlife that is living in the Stour Valley. In spring the woodlands are covered in a carpet of bluebells and in summertime meadows and verges are full of orchids and wildflowers.

#### Stour Valley Food

Treat yourselves to edible delights from award-winning farmers markets and top-quality pubs and restaurants, cafes, artisan food and 'field to fork' producers (for the grown-ups only - pop into one of four vineyards producing a Stour Valley tipple!).

Pack a picnic and choose your perfect spot - whether it be a spectacular view of the Stour Valley Landscape, nestled in a woodland, by a river bank or historic building.

Big night skies – spend a night under the stars Get wrapped up and go outside at dusk when skies are clear. Watch for barn owls gliding over tussocky grass and bats flitting around your heads as they begin a night's hunting, except in winter when bats hibernate. Families can enjoy the drama of a beautiful sunset and experience a campfire with one of the permitted campsites or adventure providers. Listen for wildlife of the night - you may hear tawny owl or little owl hooting, fox or muntjac calling, or if lucky, the loud snuffles of a hunting hedgehog. Go stargazing and spot a shooting star - away from the streetlights the Stour Valley has some of the most beautiful night-time skies.

# Visiting the Stour Valley

The Stour Valley is a nationally significant area for landscape and heritage, positioned on the border between Essex and Suffolk - and under an hour by train from London. It's the perfect getaway for families to relax and reconnect with beautiful surroundings, get closer to nature, see the local sights and get active in the great outdoors. The Stour Valley offers a wide range of activities for the whole family to enjoy including exploring picture-perfect villages and countryside by foot or bicycle, paddling on the River Stour and stepping back in time with the area's special heritage attractions and historic towns.

#### Visit the Stour Valley for a Family Adventure

The Stour Valley offers memory-making experiences and adventures for the whole family to enjoy from getting closer to nature, with wildlife themed activities, to wild camping and glamping under the stars. Get active on the water by taking a canoe or boat trip, try your hand at archery, find a castle, and glimpse a dragon on the hillside. You can step back in time with a visit to the picturesque Wool Towns or majestic manor houses. Consider staying a while longer to relax and enjoy the area, exploring at a slower pace by foot or bicycle.

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
